We're now into the second half of 2025, and there's plenty happening across the Fraser Coast!

A major milestone for our region, and one I'm proud to share, is that Council has

recently endorsed becoming a Reef Guardian Council. This is a significant step forward in protecting our waterways, with the aim of being included in future strategic planning and funding streams to help maintain and improve the health of our marine and coastal environments.

Given the unique and highly valued waterways in our area, I was one of two councillors who recently attended the Coastal Leaders and Management Conference, which played a key role in achieving this endorsement. Fingers crossed this leads to the investment and support our waterways deserve.

On a lighter note, I was unfortunately unable to attend the River Heads Fishing Club's Christmas in July event, but by all accounts, it was a fantastic weekend — great food, awesome prizes, and even better people. If you've ever thought about joining the club, I highly recommend it. You won't regret it!

In other news, our new community hub building has reached the halfway point. Construction is progressing well, with the final build phase and internal fit-out due to begin shortly — exciting times ahead for local groups and residents who will benefit from this space.

Finally, we are currently running a community consultation on cemetery services. Council is seeking your feedback to help shape a long-term plan for burial and memorial options that reflect the values, needs, and expectations of our community. You can have your say at *Fraser Coast Regional Council Cemeteries Consultation* online — we'd love to hear from you.

Since my election in October, 2024 I have consistently advocated for the upgrade of the River Heads pontoon. I am doing what I said I would do.

I am currently informed that Maritime Safety Queensland is conducting a feasibility assessment into the upgrade of the pontoon. The previous Labor government failed to budget for the replacement of the pontoon. I will continue to make representations to the Minister for Transport and Main Roads Brent Mickelberg, for the upgrade of the River Heads pontoon. In the interim, Fraser Coast Regional Council is responsible for the maintenance of the pontoon.

Last week we announced 26 units for supported accommodation for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness and another 18 units for seniors' social housing. There are several state-owned land sites in Hervey Bay that have laid dormant for years. I am committed to securing our housing foundations by making better use of these dormant land sites.

We are also making progress with the fit-out of level 2 of the Hervey Bay Hospital Emergency Building with 10 ICU beds and 25 general medical beds and a new state-of-the-art helipad. Until next time, take care.

New GP joins River Heads Family Practice



River Heads Family Practice has recently welcomed Dr Hosna Aeineh to join their little team. It is great to see the team expanding and new talents brought in. Dr Hosna is all ready for new patients. To help the community know her a little better, Dr Hosna tells us about herself and her background in the following write up:

My journey into medicine

I'm originally from Iran, and medicine has always felt like the right path for me. I was drawn to the idea of making a real difference — helping people when they're vulnerable, easing pain, and being a steady support in their health journey. I graduated as a medical doctor in 2016 and worked as a GP for almost six years before moving to Australia.

Moving to Australia

I arrived in Australia in 2023. When I was considering where to move, I had a few key things in mind. First, I wanted to continue working in medicine, which I'm passionate about. Second, I was looking for a country with a good quality of life and a healthy work-life balance. And finally, I hoped to find a place where I could feel welcome and part

of the community. Australia met all those criteria and quickly became my top choice.

Settling down and working in Australia

After arriving, I lived in Melbourne for a few months, then moved to Darwin and later to Alice Springs, where I stayed for nearly two years. Eventually, I started looking for opportunities in Queensland and came across the River Heads clinic. I had a great conversation with Dr. Ahmos Aziz Youssef and felt it would be a good fit. I'm really happy I made the move — the town is beautiful, peaceful, and full of kind people. It already feels like home.

Differences in medical systems: Iran vs. Australia

There are quite a few. In Australia, general practice plays a key role and there's a big emphasis on preventive care and continuity. Patients often have a long-term relationship with their GP, who helps coordinate their overall care. In Iran, the system is more mixed and patients often go straight to specialists. I also appreciate the focus on shared decision-making in Australia — patients are encouraged to be involved in their own care, which I find really important.

Why the move to a smaller town

Smaller towns have a unique charm. Life moves at a calmer pace, and people know each other. There's a real sense of connection and community. In big cities, it's easy to feel anonymous, but here, people greet you with a smile and you quickly feel like you belong. That sense of closeness really matters to me.

My area of interest

I enjoy the variety that general practice offers. I'm particularly interested in chronic disease management, women's health, mental health and paediatrics. I value being able to follow patients over time and support them through different stages of life.

Hopes in River Heads

I hope to build a meaningful, lasting life here — not just as a doctor, but as a member of the community. I want to be someone people can rely on, and I truly hope to give back as much as I receive. River Heads already feels like the right place to grow, both personally and professionally.

Crumbed whiting burgers with cabbage slaw and coconut mayo

Ingredients:

- 1 egg
- ½ cup sunflower oil
- ½ cup light olive oil
- 2 tbsp coconut cream
- 2 tbsp desiccated coconut, toasted
- ½ cup plain flour
- 2 tsp lemon pepper seasoning
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 ½ cups panko breadcrumbs
- 1. Coconut mayo, place egg in a small food processor. Slowly add oils a few drops at a time until the mixture starts to thicken.
- 2. Slowly pour remaining oil in a thin steady stream whisking constantly until thick and pale. Stir through coconut cream and desiccated coconut. Chill until ready to serve
- 3. Cabbage slaw, combine all ingredients in a bowl with half the coconut maoy. Season then stir to combine. Set aside until ready to serve.

Sunflower oil, to deep fry

4 bread rolls split

Cabbage slaw

2 cups shredded red cabbage

- 2 cups shredded green cabbage
- 1 carrot grated
- 2 tbsp chopped coriander leaves
- Plus extra leaves to garnish
- 4. Combine flour and lemon pepper in a bowl. Place eggs and breadcrumbs in separate bowls. Dip the fish first in flour mixture, then coat in egg and finally in the crumbs until well coated.
- 5. Heat oil in a large pan to 190C then deep fry the fish in batches for 2-3 minutes or until crisp and golden. Drain on paper towel.
- 6. serve fish in rolls with slaw, remaining coconut mayo and extra coriander to garnish.

Wildlife matters — The Unwelcome Common Myna

Branch Vice-President John Williams provided attendees at the June Wildlife Talk in the Hervey Bay and Maryborough Libraries with an informative session on one of Eastern Australia's most pervasive introduced pests, the Common Myna, aka the Indian Myna.

John explained the history of how the bird was introduced into Australia, initially as a biological control agent for pests in the market gardens of Sydney and Melbourne and later the cane fields of Far North Queensland and the Bundaberg area, and he detailed the subsequent dispersion of the bird around the east coast of Australia.

John laced his entertaining talk with historical anecdotes of some of the misguided actions of seemingly well-intentioned bird lovers who enjoyed an association with these birds once they established in an area. Unfortunately, as the bird colonised much of urban eastern Australia, it became clear that the Common Myna was a pest that would displace native bird populations, and impact tree-hollow reliant faunal species.

John also gave an account of methods to trap and remove the birds. A lot of this knowledge came from John's time coordinating an awareness and education program that was conducted by the Fraser Coast Branch of Wildlife Queensland. A series of workshops explained the process of how to construct traps and lure birds in successfully. Many of the participants from those workshops continue with their own campaigns of eradication and provide John with feedback of their success, along with advice about improving capture rates and trap modifications.

He presented a case study of a large community program in the ACT targeting the Myna which saw the bird go from the third most common bird in the Canberra region to the 20th. Nevertheless, John is fairly pessimistic about the prospect of full eradication, citing the clever and elusive nature of the bird.

At both the Hervey Bay and Maryborough talks there were comments relating to the native bird the Noisy Miner, and the suggestion that through its aggressive nature it presents as big an issue as the Common Myna. This was echoed in some of the commentary on social media in response to

promotional posts. John went to lengths to explain the difference, noting the only connection between the birds was a homophonic one.

While John acknowledged the native Noisy Miner was extremely territorial displacing many smaller more timid bush birds, he reminded them that, as a native bird, it is protected in Queensland by the Nature Conservation Act. He stressed that, unlike the Common Myna, the Noisy Miner builds a nest and does not displace native faunal species from nesting hollows.

Library talk



New bushfire plan to help protect local communities

Fraser Coast Regional Council has adopted a Bushfire Risk Mitigation Strategy to help reduce the risk of bushfires and protect local communities.

"We've all seen the devastation that bushfires can cause, such as the 2018 fire at Tinnanbar and the 2020 fire on K'gari that burned for two months and scorched half the island," Mayor George Seymour said.

"This plan helps us take early action to reduce bushfire risk close to homes, schools, parks and community facilities right across the Fraser Coast."

The Strategy, developed by a specialist consultant and with early discussions with the Queensland Fire Department, local Rural Fire Brigades, Traditional Owners and land management groups includes:

 A five-year program of fire trail maintenance and hazard reduction burns across the region

- Managing risk in 10 high-priority bush reserves
- Guidelines to reduce fire risk while protecting plants & wildlife
- Coordination with emergency services & Rural Fire Brigades to ensure rapid & effective response

A dedicated Council officer has been appointed to lead the delivery of the plan, with work starting this year.

Council has identified priority sites based on risk modelling, fire history and proximity to populated areas. These will be the focus of early hazard reduction and vegetation management activities.

"Every landholder has a responsibility to be prepared and manage their bushfire risks, and this plan is all about Council managing the risk on the land it's responsible for."

Lower speeds approved for Esplanade and Queen Street



New speed limits along Hervey Bay's Esplanade and Queen Street in Maryborough will take effect this month, making the popular strips safer and more enjoyable for residents and visitors.

Fraser Coast Regional Council Roads and Transport spokesperson Cr Denis Chapman said the Speed Management Committee endorsed the changes after a review and community feedback.

"The Esplanade is one of our busiest and most loved areas, with thousands of people walking, cycling

and driving along it every day

"Reducing speed limits in high-use areas helps improve safety for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists, especially near cafes, shops, parks and playgrounds."

The new speed limit changes include:

- 50km/h to 40km/h between Hervey Street and Fraser Street on the Esplanade
- 40km/h zones within one block of the Esplanade including McKean, Freshwater & Campbell Sts.
- Pavement markings and new signage to clearly indicate the updated limits
- Urangan to 40km/h on the Esplanade & Pier Street from Elizabeth Street to King Street

Cr Chapman said the Committee supported future extensions of the 40km/h zone once further pedestrian crossings or management measures are implemented, with planning underway for four additional crossings along the Esplanade.

Council updates community support policies

Fraser Coast Regional Council has updated a range of policies that provide financial support and concessions to residents, pensioners, community groups, and businesses.

Mayor George Seymour said Council would support the community through grants and concessions valued at about \$8.5 million in 2025/26.

The updated policies adopted include:

- Financial Hardship Policy support for ratepayers facing genuine financial difficulty, including deferred payments and interest relief.
- Pensioner Concession Policy up to \$200 per year in rate relief for eligible pensioners.
- Water Charge Relief Policy rebates for excess water use hidden leaks or ongoing medical needs, now covering leaks caused by Council maintenance or construction.
- Conservation Area Rates Concession Policy rate relief for landowners managing and protecting environmentally significant land.
- Waste Management Fee Concession Policy waives landfill disposal fees for community

groups that organise clean-ups of public spaces.

- Community Grants Policy providing grants, donations, and sponsorships to local projects, events and initiatives, with updates to ensure fair and consistent distribution of funding.
- Community Groups Concession Policy support for not-for-profit organisations delivering cultural, sporting or welfare services, up to 100 per cent on general rates and some utilities.
- Principal Place of Residence Policy correct rates and charges for main residence, not investment or rental properties.
- Refurbishment Concession Policy relief on rates and utilities for commercial property owners upgrading heritage or significant buildings closed during refurbishment works.

1/3 cup soy sauce

- Preheat barbecue or grill. Grill the chicken for
 5 to 6 min per side or until cooked through.
- Serve with rice, lime wedges and drizzled with the green sauce.
